This past December I marked 35 years since my ordination to the priesthood. I remember that day like it was yesterday. I was ordained in the Chapel of Boston University where I was a student at the time. I can still feel the cold stone floor beneath me as I lay during the Litany of

the Saints. I was so certain of my calling, and I had a vision of serving a community as their parish priest after I would finish my Master of Divinity degree in a few years. Things didn't work out that way. I finished the degree. But I have spent the last 31 years working as a counselor serving the socially marginalized. I feel strongly that I have tried to be the best counselor I can be. But the nagging voice still sounds "But what have you done for God?", "What kind of priest are you if you have never functioned as one?"

Then I read the above story. Abba Anthony, considered the father of monasticism, had lived for years seeking God in the desert – battling demons, wild animals and, even more ferocious, ignorant men. But Anthony started to feel a depression and lethargy that he was not

doing what he needed to find God – "be saved" in the parlance of that time. He was given a vision of a man who looked like himself who was working, stood up to pray, and then returned to his work. This sequence was repeated, over and over. Anthony was given to understand this was an angel who was showing him the way – do what is at hand, seasoned as it were with prayer. There was nothing more asked of him that to fulfill the work before him – God would take of the rest. And God did – Anthony was recorded as a great saint who brought God's Life to many people through his teaching, through miraculous deliverances and healings and through setting a momentum for others to follow him to their own deserts and monastic life.

When I was ordained, I promised to serve God. It is God who chooses how to use each one of us. Each of us has a special, unique way of expressing God's Life in our world. It is not to me, or any of us, to argue or question God's mission for us. Have I been a sacramental priest in the traditional sense? No. But if by "sacramental priest" one means have I brought God to others and others back to God? Yes. And I pray we will all search ourselves and be able to also answer yes, for that is what each one who follows God's path is called to do – each in our unique circumstances.

Sometimes God or His angels amongst us send messages to us in unusual ways, and sometimes we actually will recognize those messages as divinely inspired if we still our minds and pay attention, i.e. listening to our Helper, the Holy Spirit. Coincidentally, I was trying to find inspiration on what to write for this newsletter when I took another glance at the words on this card. Although I had viewed this card multiple times, I had a Light-filled instant – an epiphany - and realized that this card contained a message I needed not only to take to heart but also to put into practice. "Make time to just be" – what a concept! So what does it mean "to just be"? To me, it means to stop all physical and mental activity and retreat to a quiet space so as to still one's mind, allowing one's spirit "to just be" in God's Light refreshes one's spirit. You are in God's presence. Words are not necessary – all one has to do is "to just be". God responds with His unconditional love and peace for you are His beloved child forever worthy of His Love.

When you return your mind and heart from "just being" or resting in God back to the physical world, pause for a moment and continue your awareness of living in God's Light. Be at peace and extend that peace to all whom you encounter. Attempt to look upon all whom you encounter as God looked upon you, that is, without judgment – just as His Beloved Child.
